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After reading **The Megasaurus**, try some of the fun ideas included in the Extend the Learning and Activities pages at the end of the book.

• Make a Monster Mask

- Have a Pancake Party. Ask the young reader/listener how many pancakes they think the bakers made. Use the stacks of pancakes for some easy counting challenges.
- Word Sort. Throughout the story the vowel pattern *ow* is used. Find all the words in the story that have *ow* in them, and then discuss the different sound it makes depending on the word. Sort the word cards into piles showing those words that sound alike.
- The message of The Megasaurus is follow your convictions even when others think differently. Discuss some instances when this has happened or might happen in the child's life.
